

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
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

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## HISTORY OF THE NCCAA

The National Christian College Athletic Association was born in Canton, Ohio, in 1966, with it's purpose to provide national competition among Christian colleges. Emanating from that meeting were plans to conduct a national basketball tournament. Detroit, Michigan, became the site of that first NCCAA National Basketball Tournament. Lee College (Cleveland, Tennessee) had the distinction of winning the first championship.

— 1968 — Lee College captures first NCCAA tournament in Detroit. Michigan

At the initial tournament, the NCCAA adopted a constitution and voted to move the tournament to Chattanooga, Tennessee, at the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce and the Convention Visitor's Bureau. During the ensuing four years the eight team tournament was dominated by Azusa Pacific. Under Coach Cliff Hamlow, Azusa captured the successful tournament each of the four years.

— 1969-72 — Azusa Pacific wins next four tournaments in Chattanooga, Tennessee

In 1973, the NCCAA launched into other national sports competition. Cross-country, track, and soccer were sanctioned for national honors. Eastern Mennonite captured the first national cross-country title. Mailone College took the initial national title in. track. Northeastern Bible College (new Jersey) became the first NCCAA Soccer Champion capturing the crown held at Messiah College Pennsylvania.)

—— 1973 —— Jim Wondstra becomes first recipient of the Murchison Award

In 1974, the Kenneth and Clara Murchison Foundation established an award to the outstanding Christian baseketball player of the nation. The purpose of the NCCAA Murchison Award is to enhance the Christian purpose of athelicis and to perpetuate the Christian philosoply and faith in the evangelical colleges / universities across the nation. Jim Woudstra of Northwestern College (lowa) became the first recipient.

—— 1974 —— National Basketball Tournament moved to Chattanooga, TN

The Brainerd Optimist Club of Chattanooga voted in 1974 to sponsor the National Basketball Tournament. This highly successful civic group has enhanced the stability of the NCCAA. Hard working men have sold tickets, manned concessions stands, and performed behind-the-scene details to make the NCCAA National Basketball Tournament a first-class tournament."

— 1975 —

Division II is born Ft. Wayne Bible College wins first tournament

Bible Colleges which had competed well against the liberal arts Christian colleges submitted a plan to add a second division to the NCCAA for basketball competition. The NCCAA coaches adopted their proposal in 1975 and thus Division II was born. Division II sponsors its own national basketball tournament and awards. Baptist Bible College

(Pennsylvania) hosted the first Division II tournament which was won by Fort Wayne Bible College. The 1975 Murchison Award winner, Todd Habegger, of Fort Wayne Bible, was MVP in the tournament. Springfield, Missouri, is the new site of the tournament.

Basketball Division I and II, Cross Country, Soccer, Wrestling, and Track and Field, are now providing national tournaments and meets for NCCAA schools.

#### —— 1978 —— NCCAA is **ALIVE** and **WELL** and **GROWING**

Under the direction of President Howard Nourse of John Wesley College (Michigan) and Executive Secretary E. C. Haskell, Jr., the NCCAA is moving forward. It is very much alive and well. Christian colleges across America can rejoice in the strides being taken to provide an outlet for athletic competition on a national scope.

Keep in mind that I was a cheer leader at the University of Chat-

tanooga back in the early fifties. Also keep in mind that I was a real Georgia Bulldog booster in the late fifties in the hayday of the great Wally Butts. With this in mind I can truthfully say that the competitive spirit, the moral and enthusiasm of the fans and the support of the schools witnessed at the Lee/Temple game surpassed anything that I recall in a college game of any type, anywhere, at anytime.

Hopefully, my impression of the competitive spirit of the NCCAA, as reflected in the above-mentioned contest, is indictive of the overall spirit of the league in which we play. From the firsthand report of the Managing Editor-Michael Largent, who covered the Nation Tournament for Division I (Bible College) in Springfield, Missouri, in March, this is indeed the level of competitive activity that is to be expected. Mike came back with the glowing reports of the tournament, the people and the level of play.

If what we have seen in the events surrounding our first two issues of the VOICE OF THE NCCAA is any indication of what the future holds, we are certainly headed in the right direction. At no time in my business career have I ever been more enthusastic about a project

This is no longer true and we believe that with the pas-sing of time we can build a firm foundation of consistant advertising support that will enable us to put out a bigger and better publication. Any assistance that you can give us in this area will be greatly appreciated.

Just for the record. ... we had our share of problems getting organized. Shipping and mailing of the first edition was a real chore and a learning experience. As you know, the VOICE OF THE NCCAA is shipped to each campus in bulk via UPS each month. This requires almost one hundred different packages varying from twenty-five papers to several of more than two hundred fifty papers. It will take a while to get our system down pat.

Those of you, students, faculty, alumni, etc. who want to get your own copy of the VOICE without having to wait to buy it on campus, can assure your receiving a copy by subscribing. We have purposly kept our rates low (\$5.00 per year) so that it is easily within the range of everyone.

The next issue is scheduled for April and will contain all the excitement and details of the National Basketball Tournament for Division II teams as well as a variety of other newsworthy and interesting articles about the expanding activities of the NCCAA. I hope you will be with us!

The original organization of the NCCAA has divided the United States into eight geographic districts. Member school's within those districts function in the beginning levels of legislative action, eligibility, and tournament play throughout the year. For various tournaments, there have been special formats developed such as the six team playoffs with five regions and all at-large team for this weeks Division I Basketball Tournament.

It is especially noteworthy that an organization run on a national basis, getting its direction from the national office, functions guite well through the eight district chairmens' leadership. It is at this level that —

- The eligibility status of member schools is identified and any existing problems are corrected.
- 2) That new member colleges are processed for membership.
- That play-off procedures for the determination of national participants is developed.
- Regulation of the membership with the national office is delegated through the district chairmen.

It is throughout this structure that we have come to the point of the development of a very solid organization, both in structure and legislative and financial stability.

We have reached a point where we can look ahead to development of full time positions at the national level to give even greater and more thorough leadership to the district level of management.

In the Tournament Issue of the VOICE OF THE NCCAA, I would like to express on behalf of the Executive Committee a warm welcome to another National Basketball Tournament for Division schools, and to the national meeting of the NCCAA member schools.



## WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

I think it is fitting at this time that we are emphasizing the national meeting of coaches, district chairmen, and the executive committee in a general meeting of member schools on Saturday. In spite of the obstacles that we have had to overcome, it has been a rewarding experience to see the progress and the increased prestige of the tournament.



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
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Last year's winner, DAN SMITH, a senior at Tennessee Temple Schools was selected as the selection committee's second choice.

MEL SVENDSEN, a junior at Northeastern Bible College, was listed as the third choice.

Rick Cole has a list of honors as long as your arm, with such outstanding Team Awards as: NCCAA Division II National Runner-up (two years); NCCAA District and Regional Champion (two years); Tip-Off Tournament Champion; (three years); Kiwanis Tournament Champion; National Statistical Leader for Division II, NCCAA. His Individual Awards are: All-Conference (two years); All-District, NCCAA (two years); All-American, Division II; All-Tournament, Division II (two years) (MVP); MVP All-Tip-Off Tournament (two years); All-Kiwanis Tournament; Team MVP (two years).

And now he has another honor, and possibly the biggest of all, he is the winner of the Merchison Award, he is the most outstanding basketball player in the NCCAA!

## RICK COLE WINS MURCHISON AWARD!

RICK COLE of Baptist Bible College (PA) has been named recipient of the MURCHISON AWARD for 1978! An honor that only the most outstanding basketball player in the NCCAA can claim.

The 2.7 GPA honor student has the kind of qualifications that would make any coach cry for happiness. He is only 5'-11", 175 pounds, but he can play his position, guard, and everyone elses too. On defense, his coach Jim Huckaby writes: "His quickness and strength have been effectively used to hold opponents to half their season average while scoring over twenty-six points per game in return. He is the key to our pressure man-to-man system. He has excellent lateral movement and is a superior rebounder for his size. He leads the team in steals and has forced our opponents into more turnovers than any other member of the team." On leadership, Coach Huckaby says, "Rick IS our team leader! The entire team rallies around him. He sets the example in practice as well as in the games. His unselfishness is contagious, He leads the team in every statistical area except rebounding. When the pressure is on, all of us look to Rick. The better the opponent, the better he plays. He means as much to us as Phil Ford does to the University of North Carolina. He is probably the most popular athlete on our campus. He has the respect of our entire student body, faculty, and staff." On Christian leadership: "Rick is a vibrant Christian whose love for Christ and others has made him an outstanding Christian worker, especially with youth. He has spent the past two summers working with young people in camps, churches and schools. He has been priviledged to lead dozens of young men to the Savior. He is the most unselfish and other-person-centered athlete to ever play for me in my eighteen years of collegiate coaching. If humility, self-sacrifice, love for others and personal dedication characterizes a Christian, then Rick's testimony and influence can be called outstanding,'

And, in his comments and recommendations, Coach Huckaby states: "Rick is one of the most grateful and appreciative athletes I have ever known. Maybe it is because both of his parents are deaf mutes. Maybe it is because he was not a Christian until he was eighteen years old. At any rate, all of us at BBC feel greatly privileged to have Rick in our student body and on our team. I pray that, y sons will grow up with Rick's qualities. He is certainly the best of two worlds that interest me — Christianity and Athletics."

Up to the time of nomination (February 15, 1978), Rick has scored an average of 26.1 points per game with a total season of 495 points. His high game was 41 points against Berkshire Christian College. From the floor, Rick shot 51.6%, while shooting 68.6% from the free-throw line, and making 5.9 assists per game with a season total of 112. And on defense, Rick came down with 101 rebounds averaging 5.3 per game with a high game of 10 against Berkshire.

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In addition to an excellent cirriculum offering 23 majors, Lee College offers a wide variety of educational, spiritual, cultural and physical persuits. 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### Eleventh Annual Tournament Ranks as Best Ever!

#### Top Teams From East to West Participate

The eleventh annual NCCAA National Basketball Tournament for Division II participants is ranked as the "best ever". The statisticians point out that from the standpoint of competition it is bound to be the "best balanced" contest ever. All of the six teams entered have participated in tough divisional play to earn the right to come to the National Tournament.

According to statistics the teams are only three games apart in the won/lost category. Team strength, ability and records also appear to be well in balance.

Representing the South Region, and the host team for the tournament, will be Lee College from Cleveland, Tennessee. Lee earned their birth by virtue of their spectacular one point victory over Tennessee Temple in the final week before the tournament. Last years champion, Bethany (Oklahoma) Nazarene, did "not make the cut" and will not appear to defend their crown. With this in mind, the tournament appears to be wide open.

Joining Lee (19-13) on the court will be Biola (19-13) from LaMirda, California, a former winner in 1976, Geneva College (19-13), Beaver Falls, Pennsylvanua, Olivet Nazarene, Kankakee, Illinois, Mid-America Nazarene (15-12) from Olathe, Kansas and Northwest Nazarene (22-9) from (the at-large team) from Nampa, Idaho.

Seedings for the tournament were based on season recrods and Litkenhous ratings with the paring being made on Sunday, March 12 in Chattanooga. The top two seeds drew byes, with the other four teams being paired off for Thursday nights opening schedule.

Due to large crowds which the tournament drew last year, the tournament was moved to the excellent facilities of the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, Known as Maclellan (Big Mac) Gymnasium, the facility will seat more than four thousand with plenty of room for the overflow crowds expected.

This tournament follows by two weeks, the Division I national tournament held recently in Springfield, Missouri (see report elsewhere in this issue) which was for NCCAA colleges in the Bible College category. According to reports, the Division I contest will be a "tough act to follow". Hopefully this event will continue the upward trend now apparent for the

Rick Cole guided The Defenders with 27 connections while Mark Malin added 13.



### **BIOLA'S JIM BLAGG** WINS BOTH NCCAA AND NAIA **WRESTLING TITLES**

Senior Jim Blagg became Biola College's (Lamirada, CA.) first National Champion wrestler this past weekend at the University of Wisconsin, Whitewater, where he capdivision in the NAIA National Championships just one week after winning the NCCAA title in Kank-akee, Ill.

Blagg, who racked up a school record 114 victories in four years at Biola, decisioned Drew Whitfield of Taylor University (IN.), 8-4, in the finals Saturday night, March 4. His performance helped lead the Eagles to a 15th place finish out of 90 schools entered in the tourna-

Twice before Biola has had a wrestler in the finals, but never a champion. Mike Fisher (1969) and Rich Hay (1972) both made it to the last match before settling for sec-

Blagg, who attended Wasson High in Colorado Spring, was an All American last year after finishing sixth at Nationals.

'I felt all along that I had a chance to place," said Blagg, "but I knew I would really have to wrestle well to win. When I was at home this past Christmas, I had a chance to wrestle with a really fine wrestler, and it really helped my confidence."

According to Blagg, the finals on Saturday night brought about a grreat deal of excitement, and of course, some nervousness as well.

"I tried to keep everything in perspective," said Blagg, "I felt it was a real privilege to be out there representing my coach, my school, and my Lord.

"I can honestly say that I couldn't have done it without the Lord. He has given me strength to keep going, mentally and physically, even when I felt like quitting. Our entire team's goal is to serve Jesus Christ in life, and one way we do it is through wrestling.

Biola Coach Matt Orr said of Blagg, "He really wanted it. A couple of times he could have folded, being behind, but he kept coming.

He made things happen.
"He was just the class of the field. There was no doubt about it. The coaches at the lournament were super impressed with Jimmy. He did an outstanding job," said Orr.

Tony Ippolito finished out a fine first year with the Eagles with his two wins in the tournament, but the remaining four Biola wrestlers were knocked out early. ## **SCORING** RULES

TOURNAMENT POINTS

First place 10, Second place 7, Third place 4, Fourth place 2; Fall, Default or Forfeit 1 point, 1 point for advancement in the championship bracket and 1/2 point for advancement in consolation eliminations; 1/2 point awarded for decision won by 8 or more points, 3/4 point awarded for decision by 12 or more points.

Championship bouts are eight minutes long, divided into three periods of two, three and three minutes each. The first period will start from a standing position. Second and third periods begin on the mat in the referee's position, contestants alternating in the positions of advantage each period.

A FALL is decided when either wrestler has held his opponent's shoulders to the mat for one second. This terminates the match.

A DECISION is awarded to the contestant who scores the greater number of points in a bout where periods of one minute each (consolation matches included). A jury of two judges and the referee shall observe the overtime periods and select the winner by ballot if there is a tie after the overtime.

MATCH SCORING POINT SYS-TEM TAKEDOWN — Taking opponent to mat with advantage - 2

ESCAPE — Defensive wrestler attaining a neutral position - 1 point.

REVERSAL - Defensive wrestler comes from underneath and gains control of his opponents — 2 points.

NEAR FALL - A situation in which the offensive wrestler has control of his opponent in a pinning combination beyond a 45° angle and a fall is imminent - 2 points. Held for 5 seconds — 3 points.

TIME ADVANTAGE - The wrestler who has control over his opponent in gaining time advantage: At the end of the match if one contestant has more than one full minute net time advantage he is awarded 1 point.

FORFEIT — a forfeit is received by a wrestler when his opponent for any reason fails to appear for the match. In order to receive a forfeit, a wrestler must be in uniform and appear on the mat.

**DEFAULT** — A default is awarded in a match when one of the wrestlers is unable to continue wrestling for any reason.

Wrestlers must wrestle at all times. Penalties are awarded by the referee under the point system for stalling, legal holds and technical violations.

Any hold for punishment alone is prohibited.

Our athletic Gospel teams are our greatest public relations tool,

This quote by Coach Willy Holly of Gulf Coast Bible College in Houston, Texas, is only one of the many on the subject of athletes as Gospel teams being used in public relations for the schools.

We are very instrumental in changing our schools image for many people who attend the various churches we go to

Coach Holly said that his Gospel teams are the most sough after group on their campus by churches who want to get to know the GCBC.

We get more request for the athletes than we do for the concert choir or any of our other music groups.

The Gospel teams got started when the basketball team was holding workshops for kids during the summer at church camps. Eventually a couple of groups formed a group that would go out to various churches and get to know the people. And like all good things, it got bigger and better and soon they were traveling further and further from home.

Recently we were in the Kentucky and West-Virginia area where we had the opportunity to minister to over 400 people on a one-to-one basis.

Coach Holly said that he wasn't sure who benefited from these trips, the athletes — who gain self respect and self confidence, both on the court and off; or the people of the churches — who find out that the people from GCBC are not the "stick in the mud" that they thought they were.

There is more to our Christianity than being good sports and playing clean basketball; first we are commanded to represent Jesus Christ and spread His good news, and secondly, we are athletes representing Gulf Coast Bible College.

The only way people can really get to know each other is as short of time as the GCBC teams have, is to meet them on a one-to-nne basis. The individuals of the teams talk with the members of the churches, they stay in their nomes, have their meals with the familles, pray with them, laugh with them and in general have the kind of fellowship that only kindred spirits can have.

But it's not all fun and games.
There are a few problems to solve.
For example, money to pay expenses, missed school work and transportation.

Everybody has to work hard on financing these trips. The churches that they attend usually help out quite a bit by giving an offering, or letting the teams stay at different members houses, thus defering the cost of hotels, or both. Sometimes the teams will do special projects to try to raise the money, or they will contact some of the patrons of the school who always donate money toward their trips.

As far as school work is concerned, all work must be made up in advance. Plus, they must be careful not to exceed the number of allowed absences, so the athletes have to watch their health during the semester so they will have plenty of days reserved where they can miss and not be penalized.



We are instrumental in changing our school's image for many people in the various churches that we attend. Our athletes are our school's greatest public relations tool.




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
