National Convention Elects Vern Howard as 2nd Vice President; Rick Johnson New President

The voting delegates at the Annual Meeting of the NCCAA National Convention elected **Vern Howard** as the new 2nd Vice President for 1997-98. Howard is currently the athletics director at Simpson College in Redding, California. Howard has been very involved in the work of District 6, National Convention and Division II National Championships. The other nominees were **Mike Bona** of Emmanuel College and **Kristi Brodin** of Northwest College.

As of July 1, 1997, **Kirk Hanson** of Central Bible College will move to 1st Vice President and **Rick Johnson** of Tennessee Temple University will become the NCCAA President and Chairman of the Board of Directors. The current President, **Del Wubbena**, will assume the role of Past President.

The 1997-98 NCCAA membership dues appear on page 5. There will be a membership dues increase of 10% for 1998-99.

The NCCAA regional realignment for 1997-98 that appeared in the October 1996 News Update and that was distributed at the Annual Meeting was reaffirmed by the Board of Directors at their March 25 meeting. The regional realignment was mailed to all athletics directors on April 8.

Four years ago when the opportunity to become an elected officer came about, I decided to pursue this opportunity based on a few ideas. Today, I would like to share those with you.

1) First of all, an organization that was <u>Christian</u> in name and practice. It is important to keep the uniqueness and hold it up as a high standard in which all of our competition is conducted. We must teach our athletes to be winners, realizing that the only true winners are those who have Christ.

2) Secondly, I noticed it was an organization that has <u>committed people</u>. If anything is going to succeed and flourish it must have commitment. I want to encourage all of us to be committed to make the NCCAA all that it can be.

3) Thirdly, I recognized an organization that faced many <u>challenges</u>.

Most of us, at our respective institutions, face challenges every day that take a great deal of energy and creative thinking to solve. I want to encourage us to use those same resources to meet the challenges of the NCCAA.

Why did I decide to do this? Because of the debt.

As incoming President, I pledge to you my best to make the NCCAA the best it can be.

May Resigns as Executive Director

Dr. Barry May, NCCAA Executive Director, announced his resignation at the Annual Meeting of the NCCAA National Convention, effective June 30, 1997. He has held the position of Executive Director for eight years. As of July 1, he will assume the position of Chair of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics at Asbury College in Wilmore, Kentucky. Asbury, an NCCAA member school, has an enrollment of approximately 1,100 students.

May states, "It has been a very enjoyable eight years the Lord has given me to serve the NCCAA. Ihave been privileged to serve dedicated athletics directors, coaches, District and National Sports Chairs and the Board of Directors. We have all been called to serve our approximately 10,000 student-athletes as they continue their journey and relationship with Jesus Christ. I am so very grateful for our dedicated staff at the National Office - Julie, Susan and Rob. Many wonderful relationships have been formed with friends and donors. My thanks to all of you who have made the NCCAA ministry possible.

"The NCCAA is presently in a good position to further expand our services in such areas as quality championships, championship reimbursement and missions outreach endeavors," May said. "We need to continually focus on one of our major distinctives - to enrich the spiritual dimension of our student-athletes through athletics in Christian higher education led by coaches and athletic directors who are totally committed to the Lordship of Jesus Christ."

1998 Bobby Clampett -NCCAA Pro-Am Golf Classic dates:

March 21 - 23

Twenty-four teams, excited and with much anticipation, arrived in Oklahoma City on March 5 to participate in the 1997 Division II National Basketball Championships. This was the inaugural event for all three championships being played together.

The four-day event began with the Tip-Off Banquet at Applewoods Restaurant, hosted by Mid-America Bible College. Steve Chiles, former NCCAA athlete, challenged everyone present with the tournament's theme, THE SPIRIT IS THE DIFFERENCE. The highlight of the banquet was the presentation of the awards for All-American, Coach of the Year, Outstanding Player of the Year (Women) and the Pete Maravich Award for the Outstanding Player of the Year (Men).

The men's and women's teams from Kentucky Christian College repeated this year as Division II Champions over a very competitive field of opponents. Southwestern College, Phoenix, Arizona, won the Division IIA men's tournament.

Following the three championship games and the presentations of awards and banners, all teams present gathered on the floor for a closing ceremony. All present left believing, truly, *THE SPIRIT IS THE DIFFERENCE*.

We would like to commend our host colleges, Mid-America Bible College and Southwestern College of Christian Ministries, for the excellent event they hosted.

Tenth Annual Bobby Clampett-NCCAA Pro-Am a Record Setting Year by Sam Woolwine

Howey-in-the-Hills, Florida-Perhaps the most significant things that happened during the recent NCCAABobby Clampett Pro-Amhere at the Mission Inn Resort had little to do with golf, per se, but everything to do with the underlying principles of the National Christian College Athletic Association.

Two of those things had to do with records, the third with a person who holds records.

For the record, the first was the number of amateur participants in the Pro-Am, 96, the most ever, and what was basically considered a full field, or 24 teams. A record amount of over \$18,000 was raised at the "Missions Hole," a hole designated to raise money for missions, sending the NCCAA athletes to overseas countries and the inner cities.

The 96 players enabled the NCCAA to raise nearly \$100,000 for the organization. Of course, that isn't a net figure. There are several expenses that come out of that, but in the end a record figure and a much-needed figure will go to the NCCAA. And the increase in missions money was ... well, just a case of good, old-fashioned charity. If we don't have that, you might as well remove the extra "C" from the NCCAA.

Then there was the guy who holds records, or Bobby Richardson, the special speaker for the annual banquet. Many of us would remember Bobby Richardson not only because he was a great player for a decade or more with the Yankees, but MVP of the 1960 World Series and setting several records in the process, but more importantly that he stood up for Christ in a generation when it wasn't popular to do so.

One record he holds that may never be broken was playing in nine World Series in a 10-year period. Of course, that was back when the Yankees were the belle of baseball. Because of the parity in baseball today, it would be highly unlikely that any team will dominate the sport again like the men in pinstripes did then.

But the challenge that each of us should have taken away with Richardson's charge was being concerned about our fellow man and his standing with Christ. We are to be thankful that the Bobby Richardsons of this world allow themselves to be used at the podium that God gives them, but we who have not been blessed with as much talent athletically can be used just as effective in whatsoever niche we find ourselves. We may not be reapers, but we can be sowers of the Word.

As Richardson said, "It isn't what's in the head that counts, it's what's in the heart." A Dick Howser or Mickey Mantle may never call us, but a John Smith or a Jerry Doe may. Will you be ready to give him an answer for the Hope that lies within?

The Bobby Richardsons, the Jim Donovans and the Peter Semeyns of the world were there to encourage us, to enlighten us, to challenge us. And that's what makes the Bobby Clampett-NCCAA Pro-Am much different than most tournaments any of us will play in this year. There is a reason for that extra "C." And it makes all the difference in the world.

And we needed the encouragement, especially after the challenge that El Campeon and Las Colinas presented us, especially the former, El Campeon is ranked as one of the best courses in Florida. None of us who played will question that. It's long, it's rife with hazards and bunkers, it's greens were subtle, and it was subtlely beautiful. Even the par-5 17th, well-named we may say, "Devil's Delight."

And it was a good week to be a member of the NCCAA board. Rich Ozinga, a board member, and company - his son Jeff, Jim Kamp and Henry A. Kamp - captured first place in the College Tournament on Sunday, finishing with a stunning 19-under-par 125 in the 2-ball and winning a \$3,000 scholarship named for the irrepressible John Wheeler for Trinity Christian.

The Kamps had to have a truck to haul away their prizes. They not only won a Jones sports carry bag and \$75 gift certificate for being on the winning team, Henry won a Taylor-Made titanium driver for long drive and Jim won one of the closest-to-the-hole prizes, a Cleveland sand wedge. Still another Kamp, Len, who was not on the winning team, won a closest-to-the-hole prize as well.

Dan Wielhouwer, still another board member, was on the second-place team with Scott True, Gary Cobb and David Miller. They finished 16 under and won a \$2,000 grant named for Dave Spilman for Cedarville College.

The highlight of play, as usual, was the Monday Pro-Am when the PGA Tour pros arrived. Among those present were Paul Stankowski, Clarence Rose, Dick Mast, Steve Lowery, Don Pooley, Bob Lohr, Larry Rinker, Brian Fogt, Brian Mogg, Mike Nicolette and our host, Mr. Clampett, to name a few.

It was a different day, same old story in many ways. Past president John Bratcher was a member of the winning team, as was Kamp, Bert. Which brings up an interesting question, how many Kamps does it take to make a camp? Oh yes, Henry also won a putter with another closest-to-the-pin prize.

Brian Fogt was pro of the winning team,

shooting a 6 under-par 66, a score that won low-pro honors and leading his fivesome to a 20-under-124. Other members of the winning team were Ken Wright and Alan Queen.

Kip Byrne paced his fivesome of Pat Stillman, Bill Bracy, Jim Rosema and David Benoit to second place with a 125, while board members Dan Wielhouwer, Bobby Temple and Dan Wood were on the third-place team with Tom Fink and Sam Woolwine.

Speaking of Temple, he was low amateur for the umpteenth time, shooting an even-par 72, but he had his head almost driven as far north as Tennessee Temple. On the closing hole, he and another of his partners had ventured forward of a Fink - Tom by name - who had yet to hit his second shot. When he did, it passed close enough to Bob's head that he heard this o-o-s-s-h-h- in s-s-w-wosh.

In keeping with the board theme, Wielhouwer also won low net for "C" players with a 64 and Fink won low gross for the "D's" with a 93. Winning drivers for long drives were Ken Meyer, Jeff Ozinga and Charlie White, and putters for closest went to Jim Rosema, Jim Ozinga and Steve Westra. Gift certificates for low scores went to, in addition to Temple, Wielhouwer and Fink, Ken Meyer, Hank Ipema and Michael Schisler.

And, Clampett was once again masterful in his impersonation of Gary Player, Fulton Allem and Andy Bean, and a little deceptive with the pro long-drive. Bob, it seems, wrote his own name on the long-drive marker when actually his ball found the hazard. It was all in fun, for Stankowski, the young pro from Texas who has taken the PGA Tour by storm, who actually won.

And actually, with the golf, the fellowship, and the encouraging messages, that kind of epitomizes what it was all about, a lot of fun and three days we won't soon forget.

Hills and Mason Receive Maravich Award

The ninth annual *Pete Maravich Memorial Award* was awarded to an outstanding Christian basketball player in both NCCAA Divisions I and II. The Maravich Award, given by the NCCAA in honor of the late basketball legend who became such a devoted Christian, is awarded to the NCCAA senior student-athletes who have displayed excellence in athletics and Christian character. Receiving the Pete Maravich Memorial Award in Division I was **Brian Hills of Western Baptist College** (WBC). The award recipient in Division II

was Joel Mason of C l e a r w a t e r Christian (CCC).

This year's recipient of the NCCAA Men's Division I Basketball Maravich Award is no stranger to the NCCAA. He and his teammates have represented WBC in the NCCAA National

Tournament twice during his four-year career. The 6' and 200 pound senior off guard is from Salem, Oregon.

Hills has been the Warriors' leader and star for the past four years. He is the first player to be named all four years to the Cascade Collegiate All-Conference Team. He was named the Cascade Collegiate Conference MVP his senior year. He was named to the NCCAA All-District Team all four years and was the MVP three of those years. He was also named MVP of the All-Northwest region. He holds 10 NAIA (II) National records. He is the all-time NAIA (II) scoring leader with 3,258 points. Hills has led his team to three NAIA playoffs, two NCCAA National Tourneys, first-ever top 25 ranking, and best regular season record in school history. The NAIA and NCCAA All-American averaged 24.1 points per game during his collegiate career. On 35 occasions he scored over 30 points in a game and in 8 of those he scored over 40 points.

Hills is a credit to basketball, to his college, the NCCAA, his coach, parents, family and the Lord Jesus Christ. He is everything that the Christian student-athlete philosophy is about. He is the captain of his team and he leads them quietly through his hard play and performances. He leads one of the team's prayer groups and encourages others with his card writing. An opposing coach had this to say about Hills, "Brian loves the Lord dearly and is extremely humble. He shares his faith in Christ at camps and in the FCA. If ever there was a model Christian athlete you would want your son to be like, it would be Brian."


Joel Mason, a 6'7" senior guard, has been a four-year starter for the Cougars. He

led the Cougars to a 22-7 record during the past season. After losing four of the top five scorers from a year ago, Mason stepped up his game and according to Coach Del Wubbena, he literally put the team on his

shoulders and carried them to an incredible year. He made all of his teammates better by his leadership and court savvy.

He was awarded many honors while at Clearwater. He was FCCC All-Conference his sophomore, junior, and senior years. He was named to the NCCAA National All-Tournament team in 1995 and led the Cougars to a second-place finish. This year he was named to the NCCAA All-American first team.

Mason averaged 24.9 points, 8 rebounds and 6 assists this year. The 24.9 points per game for a season is a CCC record, along with 6 assists per game.





Hall of Fame Inducts Three

Dr. John Bratcher, Willie Holley and Larry Maddox were recipients of the NCCAA *Hall of Fame Award* at the National Convention Annual Meeting Luncheon on March 22, 1997. The purpose of the Hall of Fame Award is to recognize individuals who have given outstanding leadership and/or service to the NCCAA.

Dr. John Bratcher is completing his eighth year at Lee College where he is presently the men's and women's head soccer coach, assistant athletics director and an associate professor of physical education. He was President of the NCCAA in 1993-95 and has served on the Board of Directors from 1989 to 1997.

Prior to his coaching and teaching at Lee College, Bratcher was an associate professor of physical education at Grand Rapids Baptist College (presently Cornerstone College) for 11 years. He also coached wrestling (two years), track and field (four years), and soccer (eight years), in addition to having the responsibility of athletics director for four years.

Bratcher graduated from Grace College in 1973 with a major in physical education and health. His master's degree was completed in physical education, health and recreation at St. Francis College (IN). He obtained his doctorate in physical education from Middle Tennessee State University.

Coach Bratcher's 16-year soccer record as a men's soccer coach at the collegiate level is 234 wins, 96 losses and 21 ties. He was named NCCAA National Soccer Coach of the Year in 1982 and 1985. His men's soccer teams have participated in 11 NCCAA National Tournaments and he has been named NCCAA District Coach of the Year on 10 occasions. He has coached over 20 NCCAA All-Americans. Seven overseas missions trips in soccer have been coordinated by Bratcher. He has a U.S. National Soccer Diploma and a Brazilian National Soccer License.

Roger Haun, athletics director at Grace College states, "John Bratcher is very deserving of induction into the NCCAA Hall of Fame. As a friend and colleague, I have appreciated John's wisdom and counsel on many occasions. John has contributed many hours to helping the NCCAA grow and improve."

Willie Holley is in his 23rd year at Mid-America Bible College where he presently serves as men's head basketball coach and athletics director. Other positions he has held include Dean of Men, Financial Aid Director, Director of Development and Enrollment Manager.

Holley graduated from Oak Grove High School in 1965 after which he attended Ranger Junior College and played basketball. He graduated from Northeast Louisiana University with a bachelor's degree in business administration. Other institutions he has attended include the University of Houston, Mid-America Bible College and Oklahoma City Community College.

His excellent coaching abilities and expertise on the college level have been reflected in the 10 NCCAA Conference and Regional Coach of the Year awards he has received. In 1984 Holley was voted as the National Coach of the Year in men's basketball. Coach Holley won his 400th basketball game on November 3, 1996.

The NCCAA has benefited from the dedicated leadership of Holley as he has served as a District Chair, Regional Chair and National Sports Chair for a number of years. He presently serves as the President's Designate on the NCCAA Board of Directors.

His love and vision for the NCCAA were clearly demonstrated as he was instrumental in the planning and organizing of the three Division II National Basketball Tournaments recently hosted in Oklahoma City. This was the first time ever that these tournaments were held at one location.

"Willie's greatest success has been teaching his athletes that the giving of self to others is actually the greatest form of receiving. He models servanthood," states friend and former student, Glenn Rankin.

Larry Maddox has served at Anderson University (IN) for 22 years and is currently the assistant athletics director in charge of recruiting all sports and the head men's and women's cross country and track and field coach. Coach Maddox is a past NCCAA National Cross Country Chair.

He graduated from Anderson University with a major in social studies and a minor in physical education. He lettered three years in both cross country and track and field. His master's degree was completed in physical education at the University of Dayton.

Maddox has taught and coached for 11 years at the public high school level. He has been privileged to coach many outstanding student-athletes during his college coaching tenure. Over 100 of his men and women athletes have been honored as NCCAA All-Americans in cross country and track and field. Anderson Raven cross country teams have won the NCCAA National Championship on seven occasions. The men's track and field team has been crowned NCCAA National Champions on five occasions. He was voted NCCAA Coach of the Year during each of these 12 national championships. Also, many of his student-athletes have achieved All-American honors in both the NAIA and NCAA III.

In 1991 he was a member of the Olympic Festival track and field coaching staff and was honored by being selected as the head coach of the 1995 North Squad for the track and field Olympic festival. In the summer of 1996 Maddox was also the Operations Manager of the warm up track at the Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia.

From the 5 a.m. jogs, to the late evenings in the office, I can think of no other person more deserving of recognition. Not only for his dedication to his profession but for his high moral standards and commitment to his and others, Christian growth."

Moody Bible Receives Sports Ministries Award

At the Annual Meeting Luncheon, the 8th Annual NCCAA *Sports Ministries Award* was presented to **Sheldon Bassett**, the Athletics Director at **Moody Bible Institute**.

The NCCAA established the *Sports Ministries Award* for the purpose of recognizing member institutions and/or individuals for significant spiritual outreach through the utilization of athletic ministries. The Center for Sports & Physical Therapy, located in Marion, Indiana, has made this award possible by providing a \$1,000 gift to the NCCAA, thus enabling Moody Bible Institute to receive \$1,000 for the purpose of continued outreach ministry.

Moody Bible Institute has been a pacesetter in having the educational mission and ministry of the Solheim Center assist students in becoming mature Christians who are both whole persons and competent servants. The Moody Bible Institute faculty have utilized the Solheim Center to enhance the complete training experience of Christian missionaries and workers.

The Solheim Center has been a vehicle to reach out to the urban community by providing wholesome recreation, athletic events, physical competition and recreational camps all within an atmosphere where social, moral and spiritual values are demonstrated through student and faculty role modeling. In addition, the Solheim Center provides the Moody Bible Institute students with a laboratory for training in sports outreach ministry that can be duplicated by the students in other cross-cultural urban communities.

Student-Athletes and Their Coaches

They came to play basketball, but in the process the women from four regional Christian colleges helped at area social-service organizations and the Mahaffie Farmstead.

The event began as the National Christian College District Women's Basketball Tournament, which is being hosted by Olathe's MidAmerica Nazarene College. In addition to the MANC's Lady Pioneers, other schools represented are LeTourneau University, Bartlesville Wesleyan, and Hannibal LaGrange.

The tournament began Thursday night. But before the contest ensued, the players met to do some volunteer work.

All the players gathered at 9 a.m. Friday in the MANC gymnasium. They broke into smaller groups, mixing the players from the various schools. From there, various groups went to the Olathe Salvation Army center, the Mahaffie Farmstead and to Kansas City, Mo. to work at the City Union Mission and Harvesters, a food pantry.

Karl Kliewer, head coach of women's basketball at MANC, said this was the first time the tournament included such work.

"What we wanted to do was interact with each other," Kliewer said. "We are similar size schools, Christian colleges. A lot of schools like ours have an emphasis on service. So we decided to do this where the players can do some service work."

"There have been tournaments, but this is the first time in the middle of the season. They're usually post-season, and everyone's ready to finish up in a hurry and go home. But the athletic director at LeTourneau, Dr. Dick Beach, said, 'Let's do something different from everywhere else we play.'

"We had a coach's meeting and decided to do it, and for no particular reason we were able to host it the first time. It'll go to LeTourneau next year."

Tennessee Temple University basketball coach Rick Johnson and his assistants work very hard at recruiting, but it was a pen left by a guest in a Charlotte, N.C., hotel that brought them their current All-American.

And Johnson is even happier that their unusual introduction led to a Beyond-This-World blessing for Rahmn Thomas, who's averaging 20 points a game for the Crusaders this season after being the No. 2 scorer on the surprising team that soared to the Christian college national final last winter.

"The Lord was definitely at work," Johnson said. Thomas scored 16 a game as a senior at Charlotte's Garinger High School, the same school that produced former UTC standout Maurio Hanson, and then was signed by Clinton Junior College in South Carolina as a 3-point shooter.

He had averaged 12 points, five rebounds and three assists in his freshman season at Clinton but wanted to leave. He was leaning toward West Virginia Wesleyan - with perhaps a year at Kansas juco power Seward County first - when he suddenly noticed the printing on a pen on his kitchen table.

"School was about to start and I hadn't made up my mind," Thomas recalled. "I knew Seward County was a good team, but I really didn't want to go that far.

"We had this pen on the table and I noticed 'Tennessee Temple University' written on one side and a 1-800 number on the other side," he added. "I had no idea what kind of school this was or what division of basketball they played, but I was curious, so I called the number."

Only later did he learn that his mother, a hotel maid, had brought the pen home after it was left in a room she cleaned.

Anyway, Thomas called and was connected to Johnson, who got some basic information, checked some sources and called him back about a week later, setting up a visit and tryout.

It went well, obviously.

"Coach just pulled me into his office and said, 'Here's what we can do for you,' so I went home and told my mom and she came back with me and I signed," Thomas said.

Before the actual signing, though, Johnson discussed something else with his future star.

"He asked me why I left a blank (on the questionnaire) about whether I was saved," Thomas recalled. "I told him, 'Coach, I really didn't understand the question.'

"He led me to the Lord right there in his

"Coach Johnson cares about his players. That didn't stop there," he added. "He wants us to grow as people."

Thomas has indeed matured, he and his coach agreed. And Johnson has both gone to bat for him with administrators and continued to guide him in his adjustment from a non-Christian background to TTU's conservative rules.

The 6-foot-4 wing player sat out the first game this year as part of his learning process, but Johnson emphasized, "He's worked hard to conform and to be submissive. He's been a joy to coach."

"He works hard as a player and in our strength program, and he's a team player. Bottom line, he just loves to win."

And, yes, Johnson said, "We're making sure more of those pens get passed out."
